Parent Teacher Interviews

This term we made significant changes to our Parent Teacher Interviews. Changes involved the timing of the interviews and the booking process. As a result, we had many more interviews than is normally the case; 2,266 interviews, spread evenly across the day and into the evening, representing 42% of our families. We received much positive feedback from parents about the changes. We were particularly pleased with the numbers of students who attended with their families and hope this will increase for the next Parent Teacher Interviews on Wednesday 15 August 2012.

Like any new system there were a number of things that did not go as smoothly as we wanted. Teachers have provided us with their input and we will plan for an improved process next term. At Parent Teacher Interviews, we asked people to give us feedback about the Newsletter, with 55 people responding. Of these, 48 people view the Newsletter online with 34 receiving an email notification from our Announcement System. We asked for ideas for improvement. Some people wanted more information about the work of school Committees. It has given us a clearer picture of how to communicate effectively with you.

Chinese Papercutting Excursion

Towards the end of last term, the Year 9 Chinese class visited a Paper Cutting Exhibition in the Barr Smith Library at the University of Adelaide. The Paper Cutting Exhibition is the work of a famous paper cutting artist, Guan Xiaoyun, and the students were very fortunate to have the works explained to them by the artist herself. The exhibition and the visit of Guan Xiaoyun to Adelaide were arranged by the Confucius Institute at the University. Confucius Institutes has been set up in major cities around the world by the Chinese government to promote the understanding of Chinese culture and to support the development of business connections and the teaching of Chinese at both school and university level.



The individual paper cuts depict characters from a famous Chinese novel called *The Dream of the Red Mansions* and Guan Xiaoyun explained to the students how the personality of each of the characters from the novel can be seen through their gestures and the details of the setting in which they are depicted. She told us that each of the paper cuts took her three months to complete.

She then demonstrated to the students how she does her paper cutting and showed them how to cut a flower with buds and leaves attached. The students who were a group of all boys then showed enormous patience and precision in cutting out flowers which really looked very similar to the model that she demonstrated as can be seen in the photograph.

I think all the students would agree that this excursion gave them a valuable insight into, and practical hands on experience of a form of artistic expression which is a very important part of Chinese culture which is quite different from the art forms with which most of them are familiar.

Environment Group News

Unley High School Life Be In It Gymnasium Lighting

The student Environment Group has been a major driver of environmental change at Unley High School since its inception in 2001. They have led the school with innovative ways to reduce waste and increase recycling. They are also keen for the school to use electrical power more efficiently.

A major user of electricity at Unley High School is the three basketball court gymnasium which currently has 36 large lights operating from approximately 8.00am until 11.30pm most days. The group undertook research to replace the current lights with a more efficient system. Through their research, they identified a highly efficient plasma globes with an improved lux outcome and a watt usage nearly half of that used by the current lights. The smaller gym could then be configured to take ten lights instead of the current sixteen, representing further energy savings. The Environment Group expects the savings to be in excess of \$5,500 per year.

Additional savings will occur as the new plasma globes have a life expectancy of approximately five times longer than the current lights, hence requiring less frequent maintenance. Due to the frequent breakdown of the existing lighting system, the current average maintenance cost is approximately \$2,000 per year.

It takes approximately two minutes for the new plasma globes to reach full power in comparison to the existing lights which take fifteen minutes to reach full power. Staff will now be able to turn off lighting when not required, for example between lessons and at breaks. Additionally, if there is a power outage, players will now have only two minutes after power resumes before continuing their game.

The Environment Group believes that Unley High School is the first school in Australia to use these new plasma lights. The results of this change in lighting on the power bill will also be monitored closely by other gymnasiums across Australia.

On March 31, the Unley High School Rowing Club participated in the 'Head Of The River' rowing regatta. This is the final school's regatta for the season and as well as attracting media attention and large crowds on the West Lakes beachfront, it also has the ability to eke out every rower's, and thus every crew's best performance for the season.



Unley entered crews in sixteen events and performed admirably in all races against twelve Adelaide schools. Some of the highlights on the day included the performance by the Year 10A Boys Coxed Quad Scull crew that were beaten in a photo-finish by PAC by just 0.2 sec, the Year 9B Boys Coxed Quad Scull crew finished 3rd in the A Final, and a crew of Year 8 Boys competing against Year 9s in the Year 9D Coxed Quad Scull event, in only their second regatta, were equal leaders with just 400m to go, but unfortunately caught a 'crab' that damaged one of their riggers.

All rowers and their families are most grateful for the support of the wider Unley High School community who provided valuable vocal encouragement on the day.



On the evening of the 'Head Of The River', a Presentation Dinner for 220 people was held in the George Cresswell Hall to acknowledge the performance of all squads throughout the 2011/2012 season. New Smoke-free Laws

for Playgrounds and Covered Public Transport Stops

From 31 May 2012, World No Tobacco Day, new State Government legislation will come into effect that:

- bans smoking within 10 metres of children's public playground equipment.
- bans smoking under covered public transport waiting areas, including bus, tram, train and taxi shelters and other areas used to board or alight from public transport that are covered by a roof.
- gives local councils and other incorporated bodies the ability to apply to have an outdoor area or event declared smoke-free.

Anyone aged 15 years and older can be fined for these offences committed under the *Tobacco Products Regulation Act 1997*.
